

oyola has been known for its achievements in basketball, and of late, in cricket. But this year, the school performed well in football too, thanks to the newly-launched coaching in this sport.

The physical instructor of Loyola, Anil Sir (Mr. Anil K. R.) took the initiative to organise a football camp during the summer vacation of 2003. Encouraged by the response, the school decided to make it a regular coaching to continue the training. Coaching is usually held on Friday evenings and Saturday mornings. When necessary, it is also held on Sundays. Mr. M. G. Jayakumar, physical instructor in Bharatiya Vidya Bhavan school, serves as the coach.

The impact of football coaching was visible in the Sports Festival held

in Christ Nagar school in November 2003. In the first match, Loyola led by Aswin J. (12 A), had to take on defending champions Leo XIII. Accepting the challenge, Loyola forced a penalty shootout and won the match 4-2, with goal-keeper Joseph Ijin Davis (11 C) saving some goals. The next match was against Iyyankali Memorial School, and the Loyola footballers won 2-0 to enter the semi-final.

In the semi-final, playing against G. V. Raja, Loyola lost 1-5, the only goal for Loyola coming from Ebi (11 A). G. V. Raja went on to win the event.

Loyola is planning to play more matches in the coming year. One hopes that football coaching will attract talented students who will bring fame to the school.
